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# Introduction

### **Disposing of Data Storage Devices**

The Battery Charger MH-66 (available separately) is also available to charge the battery without using a camera.
- When inserting the battery, do not attempt to insert it upside down or backwards.
- Do not short or disassemble the battery or attempt to remove or break the battery insulation or casing.
- Do not expose the battery to flame or to excessive heat.
- Do not immerse in or expose to water.
- Put the battery in a plastic bag, etc. in order to insulate it before transporting. Do not transport or store with metal objects such as necklaces or hairpins.
- The battery is prone to leakage when fully discharged. To avoid damage to the product, be sure to remove the battery when no charge remains.
- Discontinue use immediately should you notice any change in the battery, such as discoloration or deformation.

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

## **The Camera Body**


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## **The Monitor**

The information that is displayed in the monitor during shooting and playback changes depending on the camera's settings and state of use.

By default, information is displayed when the camera is turned on and when you operate the camera, and turns off after a few seconds (when **Photo info** is set to **Auto info** in **Monitor settings** ( $\square$ 80)).






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# **Preparing for Shooting**

## Insert the Battery and Memory Card

Battery latch

Memory card slot









- With the battery's positive and negative terminals oriented correctly, move the orange battery latch (③), and fully insert the battery (④).
- Slide the memory card in until it clicks into place (⑤).
- Be careful not to insert the battery or memory card upside-down or backward, as this could cause a malfunction.

## **V** Formatting a Memory Card

The first time you insert a memory card that has been used in another device into this camera, make sure to format it with this camera. Insert the memory card into the camera, press the **MENU** button, and select **Format card** in the setup menu ( $\square$ 59).

## **Removing the Battery or Memory Card**

Turn the camera off and make sure that the power-on lamp and monitor have turned off, and then open the battery-chamber/memory card slot cover.


- Move the battery latch to eject the battery.
- Gently push the memory card into the camera to partially eject the memory card.
- Be careful when handling the camera, battery, and memory card immediately after using the camera, as they may become hot .

## **Memory Cards and Internal Memory**

Camera data, including images and movies, can be saved either on a memory card or in the camera's internal memory. To use the camera's internal memory, remove the memory card.

Preparing for Shooting

**1** With the battery installed, connect the camera to an electrical outlet.



If a plug adapter\* is included with your camera, securely connect it to the Charging AC Adapter. Once the two are connected, attempting to forcibly remove the plug adapter could damage the product.

- \* The shape of the plug adapter varies according to the country or region in which the camera was purchased. This step can be omitted if the plug adapter comes permanently bonded to the Charging AC Adapter.
- The charge lamp slowly flashes green to indicate that the battery is charging.
- When charging is complete, the charge lamp turns off. It takes about 3 hours to charge a fully exhausted battery.
- The battery cannot be charged when the charge lamp quickly flashes green, possibly due to one of the reasons described below.
  - The ambient temperature is not suited to charging.
  - The USB cable or Charging AC Adapter is not properly connected.
  - The battery is damaged.
- **2** Disconnect the Charging AC Adapter from the electrical outlet and then disconnect the USB cable.

## Notes About the USB Cable

Make sure that the plugs are properly oriented. Do not insert or remove the plugs at an angle when connecting or disconnecting them.

## Turning the Camera On While Charging

The camera does not turn on if you press the power switch while charging with the Charging AC Adapter. If you press and hold the  $\blacktriangleright$  (playback) button, the camera turns on in playback mode, and captured images can be played back. Shooting is not possible.


## Charging Using a Computer or Battery Charger

- You can also charge the battery by connecting the camera to a computer.
- You can use the Battery Charger MH-66 (available separately) to charge the battery without using the camera.

## Turn the Camera On and Set the Display Language, Date, and Time

When the camera is turned on for the first time, the language-selection screen and the date and time setting screen for the camera clock are displayed.

- **1** Press the power switch to turn on the camera.
  - The monitor turns on.
  - To turn the camera off, press the power switch again.



2 Use the multi selector ▲▼ to select the desired language and press the <sup>®</sup> button.





- **3** Select **Yes** and press the **(b)** button.
- 4 Select your home time zone and press the 🛞 button.
  - Press ▲ to display % above the map and enable daylight saving time. Press ▼ to disable it.





5 Use  $\blacktriangle \nabla$  to select the date format and press the @ button.

# 6 Set the date and time, and press the 🛞 button.

- Use ◀► to select a field and then use ▲▼ to set the date and time.
- Select the minute field and press the B button to confirm the setting.
- 7 When the confirmation dialog is displayed, use ▲▼ to select Yes and press the 🕅 button.
  - When settings are finished, the lens extends.
  - The shooting screen is displayed, and you can take pictures in scene auto selector mode.


## Changing the Language or the Date and Time Setting

- You can change these settings using the **Language** and **Time zone and date** settings in the **Y** setup menu (□, 59).
- You can enable or disable daylight saving time in the ♀ setup menu by selecting
   Time zone and date followed by Time zone. Press the multi selector ▶ and then
   ▲ to enable daylight saving time and move the clock forward one hour, or ▼ to
   disable daylight saving time and move the clock back one hour.

## The Clock Battery

- The camera's clock is powered by a built-in backup battery. The backup battery charges when the main battery is inserted into the camera or when the camera is connected to an optional AC adapter, and it can run the clock for several days after about 10 hours of charging.
- If the camera's backup battery becomes exhausted, the date and time setting screen is displayed when the camera is turned on. Set the date and time again (CP)9).


# Basic Shooting and Playback Operations


## Shooting with Scene Auto Selector Mode

## Hold the camera steady.

1


- Keep fingers and other objects away from the lens, flash, AF assist-illuminator, microphone, and speaker.
- When taking pictures in portrait ("tall") orientation, turn the camera so that the flash is above the lens.





## **2** Frame the picture.

• Move the zoom control to change the zoom lens position.



 When the camera recognizes the shooting scene, the shooting mode icon changes accordingly. Shooting mode icon



#### 3 Press the shutter-release button halfway.

- When the subject is in focus, the focus area or focus indicator is displayed in green.
- When you are using digital zoom, the camera focuses in the center of the frame and the focus area is not displayed.
- If the focus area or focus indicator flashes the camera is unable to focus Modify the composition and try pressing the shutter-release button halfway again.
- 4 Without lifting your finger, press the shutter-release button the rest of the way down.

## Notes About Saving Images or Movies

The indicator showing the number of exposures remaining or the indicator showing the remaining recording time flashes while images or movies are being saved. Do not open the battery-chamber/memory card slot cover or remove the battery or memory card while an indicator is flashing. Doing this could result in loss of data, or in damage to the camera or the memory card.

## The Auto Off Function

- When no operations are performed for about one minute, the monitor turns off. the camera enters standby mode, and then the power-on lamp flashes. The camera turns off after remaining in standby mode for about three minutes.
- To turn the monitor back on while the camera is in standby mode, perform an operation such as pressing the power switch or shutter-release button.

## When Using a Tripod

We recommend using a tripod to stabilize the camera in the following situations:

- When shooting in dim lighting with the flash mode (Q18) set to (3) (off)
- When the zoom is at a telephoto position








## Using the Zoom

When you move the zoom control, the zoom lens position changes.

- To zoom in: Move toward T
- To zoom out: Move toward W When you turn the camera on, the zoom moves to the maximum wide-angle position.
- A zoom indicator is displayed on the shooting screen when the zoom control is moved.
- Digital zoom, which allows you to further magnify the subject up to approximately 4x the maximum optical zoom ratio, can be



activated by moving and holding the zoom control toward  $\mathbf{T}$  when the camera is zoomed in to the maximum optical zoom position.

## Digital Zoom

The zoom indicator changes to blue when the digital zoom is activated, and it changes to yellow when the zoom magnification is increased further.

- Zoom indicator is blue: Image quality is not noticeably reduced by using the Dynamic Fine Zoom.
- Zoom indicator is yellow: There may be cases in which image quality is noticeably reduced.
- The indicator remains blue across a wider area when the image size is smaller.
- The zoom indicator may not change to blue when using certain continuous shooting settings or other settings.

## **The Shutter-release Button**

Press halfway



To set focus and exposure (shutter speed and aperture value), press the shutter-release button lightly until you feel a slight resistance. Focus and exposure remain locked while the shutter-release button is pressed halfway.

Press all the way



Press the shutter-release button all the way to release the shutter and take a picture. Do not use force when pressing the shutter-release button, as this may result in camera shake and blurred images. Press the button gently.

## **Play Back Images**

#### 1 Press the (playback) button to enter playback mode.

• If you press and hold down the button while the camera is turned off, the camera turns on in playback mode.



- 2 Use the multi selector to select an image to display.
  - Press and hold down AV4D to scroll through the images quickly.
  - To return to shooting mode, press the button or shutter-release button.

• When **OK**: C is displayed in full-frame playback mode, you can press the 🛞 button to apply an effect to the image.

 Move the zoom control toward  $\mathbf{T}(\mathbf{Q})$  in full-frame playback mode to zoom in on an image.





 In full-frame playback mode, move the zoom control toward **W** (**F**) to switch to thumbnail playback mode and display multiple images on the screen.



## **Delete Images**

 Press the m (delete) button to delete the image currently displayed in the monitor.

## Deleting the Image Captured While in Shooting Mode

When using shooting mode, press the  $\mathbf{\tilde{m}}$  button to delete the last image that was saved.

## **Operating the Erase Selected Images Screen**

- Use the multi selector <> to select an image to be deleted, and then use ▲ to display m.
  - To undo the selection, press ▼ to remove 
     <u>m</u>

  - Move the zoom control (□1) toward T (Q) to switch to full-frame playback or W (□) to switch to thumbnail playback.



- 2 Add <sup>™</sup> to all images that you want to delete and then press the <sup>™</sup> button to confirm the selection.
  - A confirmation dialog is displayed. Follow the on-screen instructions to complete operations.

## **Changing the Shooting Mode**

The shooting modes described below are available.

#### • Scene auto selector

The camera automatically recognizes the shooting scene when you frame a picture, making it easier to take pictures using settings that suit the scene.

#### • 💈 Scene mode Camera settings are optimized according to the scene that you select.

- S0 Special effects Effects can be applied to images during shooting.
- Smart portrait Use glamour retouch to enhance human faces during shooting, and use the smile timer function to take pictures.
- Auto mode

Used for general shooting. Settings can be changed to suit the shooting conditions and the type of shot that you want to capture.

1 When the shooting screen is displayed, press the 🖸 (shooting mode) button.



- 2 Use the multi selector ▲▼ to select a shooting mode and press the 🕅 button.
  - When scene mode or special effects mode is selected, press b to select a scene mode or effect before pressing the 🕅 button.

## Using the Flash, Self-timer, Etc.

When the shooting screen is displayed, you can press the multi selector  $\blacktriangle$  (\$)  $\blacktriangleleft$  (\$)  $\checkmark$  (\$)  $\blacktriangleright$  (\$) to set the functions described below.



#### • **\$** Flash mode

You can select a flash mode to match the shooting conditions.

• 🖄 Self-timer

The camera releases the shutter 10 seconds or 2 seconds after you press the shutter-release button.

- Wacro mode
   Use macro mode when you take close-up pictures.
- Z Exposure compensation


You can adjust overall image brightness.

The functions that can be set vary depending on the shooting mode.

## **Recording Movies**

Display the shooting screen and press the  $\bigcirc$  (\* $\blacksquare$  movie-record) button to start recording a movie. Press the  $\bigcirc$  (\* $\blacksquare$ ) button again to end recording.

• To play back a movie, select a movie in fullframe playback mode and press the 🛞 button.



# **Shooting Features**

## 🕮 (Scene Auto Selector) Mode

The camera automatically recognizes the shooting scene when you frame a picture, making it easier to take pictures using settings that suit the scene.

## Scene Mode (Shooting Suited to Scenes)

When a scene is selected, camera settings are automatically optimized for the selected scene.

Enter shooting mode  $\Rightarrow \Box$  (shooting mode) button  $\Rightarrow \mathring{Z}$  (second icon from the top\*)  $\Rightarrow \triangleright \Rightarrow \land \lor \Rightarrow$  select a scene  $\Rightarrow \bigotimes$  button

\* The icon of the last scene selected is displayed.

## 💐 Sports

- While the shutter-release button is held all the way down, the camera shoots up to about 6 images continuously at a rate of about 1.1 fps (when image mode is set to <u>DD</u>).
- The frame rate for continuous shooting may vary depending on the current image mode setting, the memory card used, or shooting conditions.
- Focus, exposure, and hue are fixed at the values determined with the first image in each series.

## X Party/indoor

 To avoid the effects of camera shake, hold the camera steady. In dark surroundings, the use of a tripod is recommended.

#### 🖬 Night landscape

- On the screen displayed when Might landscape is selected, select → Handheld or Tripod.
  - 🛱 Hand-held (default setting): Select this option to produce shots with reduced blurring and noise even when the camera is hand-held.

- Macro mode (III 35) is enabled and the camera automatically zooms to the closest position at which it can focus.

## 🦋 Pet portrait


- When you point the camera at a dog or cat, the camera detects the pet's face and focuses on it. By default, the camera detects a dog or cat face and automatically releases the shutter (pet portrait auto release).
- On the screen displayed when **%** Pet portrait is selected, select S Single or Continuous.
  - S Single: The camera captures one image when a dog or cat face is detected.
  - Continuous: The camera captures three images continuously when a dog or cat face is detected.

## V Pet Portrait Auto Release

- Press the multi selector  $\blacktriangleleft$  ( $\circlearrowright$ ) to change the **Pet portrait auto release** setting.
  - 📓: The camera detects a dog or cat face and automatically releases the shutter.
  - OFF: The camera does not release the shutter automatically, even if a dog or cat face is detected. Press the shutter-release button. The camera also detects human faces when OFF is selected.
- Pet portrait auto release is set to OFF after five bursts have been taken.
- Shooting is also possible by pressing the shutter-release button, regardless of the Pet portrait auto release setting. When U Continuous is selected, you can take pictures continuously while holding down the shutter-release button all the way.

## Focus Area

 When the camera detects a face, the face is displayed inside a yellow border. When the camera acquires focus on a face displayed inside a double border (focus area), the double border changes to green. If no faces are detected, the camera focuses on the subject in the center of the frame.



Under some shooting conditions, the pet face
 may not be detected and other subjects may be displayed inside a border.

## Notes About Panorama Assist


- Up to three images can be taken and combined in a panorama series. Shooting automatically ends after the third image is taken.
- A panorama image may not be saved if the translucent portion of an image is not properly aligned with the subject when taking the next image.
- The range of the image seen in the saved image is narrower than that seen in the monitor at the time of shooting.
- If shooting ends after only the first image is taken, the camera cannot scroll the playback of the image (C226).
- Shooting for the panorama series is terminated if the auto off function (\$\box\$85) initiates standby mode during shooting. Setting the time allowed to elapse before the auto off function is enabled to a longer setting is recommended.
- Images cannot be deleted while shooting in panorama assist mode. When shooting a new image, return to step 1 and start over again.

## AE/AF-L Indicator

In panorama assist scene mode, exposure, white balance, and focus for all images in a panorama are fixed at the values for the first image in each series. When the first image is taken, AE/AF-L is displayed to indicate that exposure, white balance, and focus are locked.



Switch to playback mode ( $\square$ 14), display an image captured using panorama assist in full-frame playback mode, and then press the O button to scroll the image in the direction that was used when shooting.

#### Red-eye Reduction

If the camera detects red eye while saving an image, the affected area is processed to reduce red-eye before the image is saved.

Note the following when shooting:

- More time than usual is required to save images.
- Red-eye reduction may not produce the desired results in some situations.
- In rare cases, red-eve reduction may be applied unnecessarily to other areas of the image. In these cases, select another flash mode and take the picture again.

## Self-timer






## Focusing

The focus area varies depending on the shooting mode.

## **Using Face Detection**

In the following shooting modes, the camera uses face detection to automatically focus on human faces.

- 2 / 2 Portrait, / A Night portrait, or
   Backlighting in (scene auto selector) mode ( 19)
- Portrait or Night portrait scene mode (\$\overline\$20\$)



- Smart portrait mode (D28)
- When AF area mode (167) in 1 (auto) mode (130) is set to Face priority.

If the camera detects more than one face, a double border is displayed around the face that the camera focuses on, and single borders are displayed around the other faces.

If the shutter button is pressed halfway when no faces are detected:

- In set (scene auto selector) mode, the focus area changes depending on the scene.
- In **Portrait** and **Night portrait** scene modes or in smart portrait mode, the camera focuses in the center of the frame.
- In (auto) mode, the camera selects the focus area containing the subject closest to the camera.

## Notes About Face Detection

- The camera's ability to detect faces depends on a variety of factors, including the direction in which the faces are looking.
- The camera cannot detect faces in the following situations:
  - When faces are partially hidden by sunglasses or otherwise obstructed
  - When faces take up too much or too little of the frame

## **Using Skin Softening**

When the shutter is released while using one of the shooting modes listed below, the camera detects human faces and processes the image to soften facial skin tones (up to three faces).

- Smart portrait mode (CC 28)
  - -\_\_\_The amount of the Skin softening effect can be adjusted.
- Portrait, 🖼 Night portrait, or 🔁 Backlighting in (scene auto selector) mode (C19)
- Portrait or Night portrait scene mode (20)

Editing functions such as **Skin softening** can be applied to saved images by using **Glamour retouch** (CD 52) even after shooting.

## Notes About Skin Softening

- It may take more time than usual to save images after shooting.
- Under some shooting conditions, the desired skin softening results may not be achieved, and skin softening may be applied to areas of the image where there are no faces.

## **Using Target Finding AF**

When **AF area mode** (<sup>[]</sup>67) in **(**auto) mode is set to **Target finding AF**, the camera focuses in the manner described below when you press the shutter-release button halfway.


- The camera detects the main subject and focuses on it. When the subject is in focus, the focus area is displayed in green. If a human face is detected, the camera automatically sets focus priority on it.
- If no main subject is detected, the camera automatically selects one or more of the nine focus areas containing the subject closest to the camera. When the subject is in focus, the focus areas that are in focus are displayed in green.

## Notes About Target Finding AF

- Depending on shooting conditions, the subject that the camera determines to be the main subject may vary.
- The main subject may not be detected when using certain White balance settings.
- The camera may not detect the main subject appropriately in the following situations:
  - When the subject is very dark or bright
  - When the main subject lacks clearly defined colors
  - When the shot is framed so that the main subject is at the edge of the monitor
  - When the main subject is composed of a repeating pattern







Focus areas

## **Subjects Not Suitable for Autofocus**

The camera may not focus as expected in the following situations. In rare cases, the subject may not be in focus despite the fact that the focus area or the focus indicator is displayed in green:

- Subject is very dark
- Objects of sharply differing brightness are included in the scene (e.g. the sun behind the subject makes that subject appear very dark)
- No contrast between the subject and surroundings (e.g. a portrait subject wearing a white shirt is standing in front of a white wall)
- Several objects are at different distances from the camera (e.g. the subject is inside a cage)
- Subjects with repeating patterns (window blinds, buildings with multiple rows of similarly shaped windows, etc.)
- Subject is moving rapidly

In the situations noted above, try pressing the shutter-release button halfway to refocus several times, or focus on another subject positioned at the same distance from the camera as the actual desired subject, and use focus lock ( $\square$ 43).

## **Focus Lock**

Focus lock shooting is recommended when the camera does not activate the focus area that contains the desired subject.

## Notes About Red-eye Correction

- Red-eye correction can only be applied to images when red-eye is detected.
- Red-eye correction can be applied to pets (dogs or cats) even if their eyes are not red.
- Red-eye correction may not produce the desired results in some images.
- In rare cases, red-eye correction may be applied unnecessarily to other areas of the image.



## Notes About Glamour Retouch

- If no faces are detected, a warning is displayed and the screen returns to the playback menu.
- The glamour retouch function is available only for images captured at an ISO sensitivity of 1600 or lower, and the image size of 640 × 480 or larger.

## **Area Captured in Movies**

   Movie frame+auto info, you can confirm the area that will be captured in
   a movie before you start recording.

## **Maximum Movie Recording Time**

Individual movie files cannot exceed 2 GB in size or 29 minutes in length, even when there is sufficient free space on the memory card for longer recording.

- The remaining recording time for a single movie is displayed on the shooting screen.
- The actual remaining recording time may vary depending on the movie content, subject movement, or type of memory card.
- Memory cards with an SD Speed Class rating of 6 or faster are recommended when recording movies (<sup>11</sup>22). Movie recording may stop unexpectedly when memory cards with a lower Speed Class rating are used.

## Notes About Camera Temperature

- The camera may become hot when shooting movies for an extended period of time or when the camera is used in a hot area.
- If the inside of the camera becomes extremely hot when recording movies, the camera will automatically stop recording.

The amount of time remaining until the camera stops recording (a) 10s) is displayed.

After the camera stops recording, it turns itself off.

Leave the camera off until the inside of the camera has cooled.

#### **Notes About Movie Recording**

## Notes About Saving Images or Movies

The indicator showing the number of exposures remaining or the indicator showing the remaining recording time flashes while images or movies are being saved. **Do** not open the battery-chamber/memory card slot cover or remove the battery or memory card while an indicator is flashing. Doing this could result in loss of data, or in damage to the camera or the memory card.

## Notes About Recorded Movies

- When recording movies with 220 m 720/30p or 220 m 720/25p selected for Movie options, the angle of view (the area captured in the recorded movie) is smaller than when taking still images.
- Optical zoom cannot be adjusted once movie recording begins.
- There may be some degradation in image quality when digital zoom is used. Subjects can be magnified up to 4× the digital zoom ratio that was applied before movie recording began.
- The sounds of zoom control operation, autofocus lens drive movement, and aperture operation when brightness changes may be recorded.
- Smear (
   <sup>10</sup>102) visible in the monitor with movie recording will be recorded with movies. Avoiding bright objects such as the sun, reflections of the sun, and electric lights when recording movies is recommended.
- Depending on the distance to the subject or the amount of zoom applied, colored stripes may appear on subjects with repeating patterns (fabrics, lattice windows, etc.) during movie recording and playback. This occurs when the pattern in the subject and the layout of the image sensor interfere with each other; it is not a malfunction.

## Notes About Electronic VR During Movie Recording

When **Electronic VR** (**D**83) is set to **On** in the setup menu, the angle of view (the area captured in the recorded movie) is smaller than when taking still images.

## Notes About Autofocus for Movie Recording

Autofocus may not perform as expected (QQ42). Should this occur, try the following:

- 1. Set **Autofocus mode** in the movie menu to **Single AF** (default setting) before starting movie recording.
- Frame another subject (positioned at the same distance from the camera as the intended subject) in the center of the frame, press the ● (\*★ movie-record) button to start recording, and modify the composition.

## **Operations During Movie Playback**



## Number of Images That Can Be Saved



Play back images one by one in an automated "slide show." When movie files are played back in the slide show, only the first frame of each movie is displayed.

## Use the multi selector ▲▼ to select Start and press the ℗ button.

- The slide show begins.
- To change the interval between images, select Frame intvl, press the W button, and specify the desired interval time before selecting Start.
- To repeat the slide show automatically, select Loop and press the B button before selecting Start.
- The maximum playback time is up to about 30 minutes even if **Loop** is enabled.

## 2 End or restart the slide show.

 The screen shown on the right is displayed after the slide show ends or is paused. To exit the show, select and then press the Sutton. To resume the slide show, select
 and then press the Subton.



## **Operations During Playback**

- Use the multi selector 
   to display the previous/next image. Press and hold to rewind/fast forward.
- Press the 🕑 button to pause or end the slide show.

## Protect

Press the ▶ button (playback mode) → MENU button → Protect → ℗ button

The camera protects selected images from accidental deletion.

Select images to protect or cancel protection from the image selection screen ( $\fbox{75}).$ 

Note that formatting the memory card or the camera's internal memory permanently deletes all data including protected files (**1**86).

## **Rotate Image**

Press the ▶ button (playback mode) → MENU button → Rotate image → 
⑧ button

Specify the orientation in which saved images are displayed during playback. Still images can be rotated 90 degrees clockwise or 90 degrees counterclockwise.

Select an image from the image selection screen ( $\square75$ ). When the Rotate image screen is displayed, press the multi selector  $\clubsuit$  to rotate the image 90 degrees.

## Copy (Copy Between the Memory Card and Internal Memory)

Images can be copied between a memory card and the internal memory.

- When a memory card that contains no images is inserted and the camera is switched to playback mode, Memory contains no images. is displayed. In that case, press the MENU button to select Copy.
- Use the multi selector ▲▼ to select a destination option to which images are copied and press the () button.



> When you choose Selected images, use the image selection screen to specify images (\$\overline\$75).



## Notes About Copying Images

- Only files in formats that this camera can record can be copied.
- Operation is not guaranteed with images captured with another make of camera or that have been modified on a computer.

## **The Image Selection Screen**

When an image selection screen such as the one shown on the right is displayed while operating the camera, follow the procedures described below to select the images.

#### 1 Use the multi selector $\triangleleft$ to select an image.



## Notes About Date Stamp

- Stamped dates form a permanent part of image data and cannot be deleted. The date and time cannot be stamped on images after they have been captured.
- The date and time cannot be stamped in the following situations:
  - When using Panorama assist scene mode
  - When shooting movies
- The stamped date and time may be difficult to read when using a small image size.

#### Printing a Shooting Date on Images Without a Date Stamp

You can transfer images to a computer and use the ViewNX-i software (\$\$\mathbb{P}\$7) to imprint the shooting date on the images when they are printed.

  - When slow sync with red-eye reduction (🛄 38) is used.
  - When exposure exceeds a certain length of time.
  - When Sports, Night portrait, Dusk/dawn, Night landscape, Fireworks show, or Backlighting scene mode is used.

- When **Electronic VR** is set to **On**, the angle of view (the area captured in the recorded movie) during movie recording is smaller.

Use this option to format a memory card or the internal memory.

Formatting the memory cards or internal memory permanently deletes all data. Data that has been deleted cannot be recovered. Make sure to save important images to a computer before formatting.

#### Formatting a Memory Card

- Insert a memory card into the camera.
- Select Format card in the setup menu and then press the 🛞 button.

#### Formatting the Internal Memory

- Remove the memory card from the camera.
- Select Format memory in the setup menu and then press the 🛞 button.

To start formatting, select **Format** on the screen that is displayed and press the 🛞 button.

 Do not turn the camera off or open the battery-chamber/memory card slot cover during formatting.

Select a language for display of camera menus and messages.

Select from NTSC and PAL.

Both NTSC and PAL are standards for analog color television broadcasting.

• The available frame rates in **Movie options** (**D**76) vary depending on the video mode setting.

## **Charge by Computer**

Press the MENU button  $\Rightarrow$   $\Upsilon$  menu icon  $\Rightarrow$  Charge by computer  $\Rightarrow$  @ button

Option	Description
<b>AUTO</b> Auto (default setting)	When the camera is connected to a computer that is running (1990), the battery inserted into the camera is automatically charged using power supplied by the computer.
Off	The battery inserted into the camera is not charged when the camera is connected to a computer.

### Notes About Charging with a Computer

- When connected to a computer, the camera turns on and starts charging. If the camera is turned off, charging stops.
- About 3 hours are required to charge a fully exhausted battery. Charging time increases when images are transferred while the battery is charging.
- The camera turns off automatically if there is no communication with the computer for 30 minutes after the battery has finished charging.

#### When the Charge Lamp Quickly Flashes Green

Charging cannot be performed, possibly due to one of the reasons described below.

- The ambient temperature is not suited to charging. Charge the battery indoors with an ambient temperature of 5°C to 35°C (41°F to 95°F).
- The USB cable is not connected correctly, or the battery is faulty. Make sure the USB cable is connected correctly or replace the battery if necessary.
- The computer is in sleep mode and is not supplying power. Wake up the computer.
- The battery cannot be charged because the computer cannot supply power to the camera due to the computer's settings or its specifications.

## **Reset All**

Press the MENU button  $\rightarrow$   $\Upsilon$  menu icon  $\rightarrow$  Reset all  $\rightarrow$   $\circledast$  button

When **Reset** is selected, the camera's settings are restored to their default values.

• Some settings, such as Time zone and date or Language, are not reset.

#### Resetting File Numbering

To reset file numbering to "0001", delete all images saved on the memory card or in the internal memory (**Q**15) before selecting **Reset all**.



## Connecting the Camera to a TV, Printer, or Computer

You can enhance your enjoyment of images and movies by connecting the camera to a TV, printer, or computer.



- Before connecting the camera to an external device, make sure the remaining battery level is sufficient and turn the camera off. Before disconnecting, make sure to turn the camera off.
- If the AC Adapter EH-62G (available separately) is used, this camera can be powered from an electrical outlet. Do not use any other make or model of AC adapter as it may cause the camera to heat up or malfunction.
- For information about the connection methods and subsequent operations, refer to the documentation included with the device in addition to this document.

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Images and movies captured with the camera can be viewed on a TV.

Connection method: Connect the video and audio plugs of an optional audio video cable to the TV's input jacks.

#### Printing images without using a computer

If you connect the camera to a PictBridge-compatible printer, you can print images without using a computer. Connection method: Connect the camera directly to the printer's USB port with the USB cable.

#### Viewing and organizing images on a computer

You can transfer images and movies to a computer for viewing and editing.

Connection method: Connect the camera to the computer's USB port with the USB cable.

- Before connecting to a computer, install ViewNX-i on the computer (<sup>1997</sup>).
- If any USB devices that draw the power from the computer are connected, disconnect them from the computer before you connect the camera to it. Connecting the camera and other USB-powered devices to the same computer simultaneously may cause a camera malfunction or excessive power supply from the computer, which could damage the camera or memory card.



## **1** Turn off the camera and connect it to the TV.






# Connecting the Camera to a Printer (Direct Print)

Users of PictBridge-compatible printers can connect the camera directly to the printer and print images without using a computer.

## **Connecting the Camera to a Printer**

- **1** Turn on the printer.
- **2** Turn off the camera and connect it to the printer using the USB cable.
  - Make sure that the plugs are properly oriented. Do not insert or remove the plugs at an angle when connecting or disconnecting them.



#### **3** The camera is automatically turned on.

 The PictBridge startup screen ((1)) is displayed in the camera monitor, followed by the Print selection screen ((2)).



#### If the PictBridge Startup Screen Is Not Displayed

When **Auto** is selected for **Charge by computer** (\$\overline\$188), it may be impossible to print images with direct connection of the camera to some printers. If the PictBridge startup screen is not displayed after the camera is turned on, turn the camera off and disconnect the USB cable. Set **Charge by computer** to **Off** and reconnect the camera to the printer.

## **Printing Images One at a Time**

- Use the multi selector ◀► to select the desired image and press the Ø button.
  - Move the zoom control toward W (<sup>1</sup>) to switch to thumbnail playback or T (<sup>2</sup>) to switch to full-frame playback.

# 2 Use ▲▼ to select **Copies** and press the <sup>®</sup> button.

• Use ▲▼ to set the desired number of copies (up to nine) and press the 🐼 button.





ViewNX-i is free software that enables you to transfer images and movies to your computer for viewing and editing.

To install ViewNX-i, download the latest version of the ViewNX-i installer from the following website and follow the on-screen instructions to complete installation.

## **Transferring Images to a Computer**


#### **1** Prepare a memory card that contains images.

You can use any of the methods below to transfer images from the memory card to a computer.

- SD memory card slot/card reader: Insert the memory card into the card slot of your computer or the card reader (commercially available) that is connected to the computer.
- Direct USB connection: Turn the camera off and ensure that the memory card is inserted in the camera. Connect the camera to the computer using the USB cable.

The camera automatically turns on.

To transfer images that are saved in the camera's internal memory, remove the memory card from the camera before connecting it to the computer.



If a message is displayed prompting you to choose a program, select Nikon Transfer 2.

#### When using Windows 7

If the dialog shown at right is displayed, follow the steps below to select Nikon Transfer 2.

- 1 Under Import pictures and videos, click Change program. A program selection dialog will be displayed; select Import File using Nikon Transfer 2 and click OK.
- 2 Double-click Import File.
- When using Windows 10 or Windows 8.1

If the dialog shown on the right is displayed, click the dialog and then click Import File/Nikon Transfer 2.



#### When using Mac OS X

If Nikon Transfer 2 does not automatically start, launch the Image Capture application that comes bundled with Mac while the camera and your computer are connected, and select Nikon Transfer 2 as the default application to open when the camera is connected to your computer.

If the memory card contains a large number of images, it may take a while for Nikon Transfer 2 to start. Wait until Nikon Transfer 2 starts.

#### Notes About Connecting the USB Cable

Operation is not guaranteed if the camera is connected to the computer via a USB hub.

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## **2** After Nikon Transfer 2 starts, click **Start Transfer**.



 Image transfer begins. When image transfer is complete, ViewNX-i starts and the transferred images are displayed.

#### **3** Terminate the connection.

- If you are using a card reader or card slot, choose the appropriate option in the computer operating system to eject the removable disk corresponding to the memory card and then remove the memory card from the card reader or card slot.
- If the camera is connected to the computer, turn the camera off and disconnect the USB cable.

## **Technical Notes**

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## **Caring for the Product**

Observe the precautions described below in addition to the warnings in "For Your Safety" ( $\Box$ vi–viii) when using or storing the device.

## The Camera

#### Do Not Apply Strong Impact to the Camera

The product may malfunction if subjected to strong shock or vibration. In addition, do not touch or apply force to the lens or lens cover.

#### Keep Dry

The device will be damaged if immersed in water or subjected to high humidity.

#### **Avoid Sudden Changes in Temperature**

Sudden changes in temperature, such as when entering or leaving a heated building on a cold day, can cause condensation to form inside the device. To prevent condensation, place the device in a carrying case or a plastic bag before exposing it to sudden changes in temperature.

#### **Keep Away from Strong Magnetic Fields**

Do not use or store this device in the vicinity of equipment that generates strong electromagnetic radiation or magnetic fields. Doing so could result in loss of data or camera malfunction.

#### Do Not Point the Lens at Strong Light Sources for Extended Periods

Avoid pointing the lens at the sun or other strong light sources for extended periods when using or storing the camera. Intense light may cause the image sensor to deteriorate or produce a white blur effect in photographs.

## Turn the Product Off Before Removing or Disconnecting the Power Source or Memory Card

Do not remove the battery while the product is on, or while images are being saved or deleted. Forcibly cutting power in these circumstances could result in loss of data or in damage to product memory or internal circuitry.

#### Notes About the Monitor

- Monitors and electronic viewfinders are constructed with extremely high precision; at least 99.99% of pixels are effective, with no more than 0.01% being missing or defective. Hence while these displays may contain pixels that are always lit (white, red, blue, or green) or always off (black), this is not a malfunction and has no effect on images recorded with the device.
- Images in the monitor may be difficult to see under bright lighting.
- Do not apply pressure to the monitor, as this could cause damage or malfunction. Should the monitor break, care should be taken to avoid injury caused by broken glass and to prevent the liquid crystal from the display touching the skin or entering the eyes or mouth.

#### Notes About Smear

White or colored streaks may be visible when bright subjects are framed in the monitor. This phenomenon, known as "smear," occurs when extremely bright light strikes the image sensor; it is characteristic of image sensors and does not indicate a malfunction. Smear may also take the form of partial discoloration in the monitor during shooting. It does not appear in images saved with the camera except in the cases of movies. When recording movies, we recommend that you avoid bright subjects such as the sun, reflected sunlight, and electric lights.

## The Battery

#### **Precautions for Use**

- Note that the battery may become hot after use.
- Do not use the battery at ambient temperatures below 0°C (32°F) or above 40°C (104°F) as this could cause damage or malfunction.
- If you notice any abnormalities such as excessive heat, smoke, or an unusual smell coming from the battery, immediately discontinue use and consult your retailer or Nikon-authorized service representative.
- After removing the battery from the camera or optional battery charger, put the battery in a plastic bag, etc. in order to insulate it.

#### **Charging the Battery**

Check the battery level before using the camera and replace or charge the battery if necessary.

- Charge the battery indoors with an ambient temperature of 5°C to 35°C (41°F to 95°F) before use.
- A high battery temperature may prevent the battery from charging properly or completely, and may reduce battery performance. Note that the battery may become hot after use; wait for the battery to cool before charging.
   When charging the battery inserted into this camera using the Charging AC Adapter or a computer, the battery is not charged at battery temperatures below 0°C (32°F) or above 45°C (113°F).
- Do not continue charging once the battery is fully charged as this will result in reduced battery performance.
- The battery temperature may increase during charging. However, this is not a malfunction.

#### **Carrying Spare Batteries**

Whenever possible, carry fully charged spare batteries when taking pictures on important occasions.

#### Using the Battery When Cold

On cold days, the capacity of batteries tends to decrease. If an exhausted battery is used at a low temperature, the camera may not turn on. Keep spare batteries in a warm place and exchange as necessary. Once warmed, a cold battery may recover some of its charge.

#### **Battery Terminals**

Dirt on the battery terminals may prevent the camera from functioning. Should the battery terminals become dirty, wipe them off with a clean, dry cloth before use.

#### **Charging an Exhausted Battery**

Turning the camera on or off while an exhausted battery is inserted in the camera may result in reduced battery life. Charge the exhausted battery before use.

#### **Storing the Battery**

- Always remove the battery from the camera or optional battery charger when it is not being used. Minute amounts of current are drawn from the battery while it is in the camera, even when not in use. This may result in excessive battery drain and complete loss of function.
- Recharge the battery at least once every six months and completely exhaust it before returning it to storage.
- Put the battery in a plastic bag, etc. in order to insulate it and store it in a cool place. The battery should be stored in a dry location with an ambient temperature of 15°C to 25°C (59°F to 77°F). Do not store the battery in hot or extremely cold locations.

#### **Battery Life**

A marked drop in the time a fully charged battery retains its charge, when used at room temperature, indicates that the battery needs to be replaced. Purchase a new battery.

#### **Recycling Used Batteries**

Replace the battery when it no longer holds a charge. Used batteries are a valuable resource. Please recycle used batteries in accordance with local regulations.

## The Charging AC Adapter

- The Charging AC Adapter EH-72P/EH-72P/CH is for use only with compatible devices. Do not use with another make or model of device.
- Do not, under any circumstances, use another make or model of AC adapter other than Charging AC Adapter EH-72P/EH-72P/CH or USB-AC adapter. Failure to observe this precaution could result in overheating or in damage to the camera.
- The EH-72P/EH-72PCH is compatible with AC 100–240 V, 50/60 Hz electrical outlets. When using in other countries, use a plug adapter (commercially available) as necessary. For more information about plug adapters, consult your travel agency.

## **Memory Cards**

#### **Precautions for Use**

- Use only Secure Digital memory cards (QQ122).
- Be sure to follow the precautions described in the documentation included with the memory card.
- Do not put labels or stickers on memory cards.

#### Formatting

- Do not format the memory card using a computer.
- The first time you insert a memory card that has been used in another device into this camera, be sure to format it with this camera. We recommend formatting new memory cards with this camera before using them with this camera.
- Note that formatting a memory card permanently deletes all images and other data on the memory card. Be sure to make copies of any images you wish to keep before formatting the memory card.
- If the message Card is not formatted. Format card? is displayed when the camera is turned on, the memory card must be formatted. If there is data that you do not want to delete, select No. Copy the necessary data to a computer, etc. If you want to format the memory card, select Yes. The confirmation dialog will be displayed. To start formatting, press the W button.
- Do not perform the following during formatting, while data is being written to or deleted from the memory card, or during data transfer to a computer. Failure to observe this precaution could result in the loss of data or in damage to the camera or memory card:
  - Open the battery-chamber/memory card slot cover to remove/insert the battery or memory card.
  - Turn off the camera.
  - Disconnect the AC adapter.

## **Cleaning and Storage**

## Cleaning

Do not use alcohol, thinner, or other volatile chemicals.

Lens	Avoid touching glass parts with your fingers. Remove dust or lint with a blower (typically a small device with a rubber bulb attached to one end that is pumped to produce a stream of air out the other end). To remove fingerprints or other stains that cannot be removed with a blower, wipe the lens with a soft cloth, using a spiral motion that starts at the center of the lens and working toward the edges. If this fails, clean the lens using a cloth lightly dampened with commercial lens cleaner.
Monitor	Remove dust or lint with a blower. To remove fingerprints and other stains, clean the monitor with a soft, dry cloth, being careful not to apply pressure.
Body	Use a blower to remove dust, dirt, or sand, then wipe gently with a soft, dry cloth. After using the camera at the beach or other sandy or dusty environment, wipe off any sand, dust, or salt with a dry cloth lightly dampened with fresh water and dry thoroughly. <b>Note that foreign matter inside the camera could cause damage not covered by the warranty.</b>

#### Storage

Remove the battery if the camera will not be used for an extended period. To prevent mold or mildew, take the camera out of storage at least once a month. Turn the camera on and release the shutter a few times before putting the camera away again. Do not store the camera in any of the following locations:

- Places that are poorly ventilated or subject to humidity of over 60%
- Exposed to temperatures above 50°C (122°F) or below −10°C (14°F)
- Next to equipment that produces strong electromagnetic fields, such as televisions or radios

For storing the battery, follow the precautions in "The Battery" ( $\square$ 102) in "Caring for the Product" ( $\square$ 101).
